DR FURBERVILLE'S MORRIS. MINUTES OF A.G.M. 1984

The meeting took place on 11th Sept. , chez Linda. The following members were present: Linda, Valerie, Chris, Rod, Beverley, Richard in his new glasses, Rachel, Steve, Dave, Di, Kath, David.

Apologies for absence were received from Yadi and others. Camp-followers present were Phil and Jamie.

The meeting was chaired by Rod and minutes taken by Chris. He stated (not to mention started) at 8.30 p.m. with Rod reading last year's minutes, which were passed by general consent. The meeting then followed last year's agenda, i.e.

1. Elections

- a) Squire: Rod expressed a wish to stand down and a feeling that new people should take over the major posts. There was general agreement with the latter point; Yadi was proposed and elected unanimously.
- b) Foreman: Richard expressed a wish to stand down, proposed Beverley. Beverley proposed Rod. Rod demurred. Rod seconded Bev. Bev elected.
- c) Barman: In spite of general flux, it was agreed to be convenient for Richard to carry on, at least for one more year. And he will.
- d) Treasurer: Unfortunately Mark was not present and nobody knew whether or not he wished to continue as Treasurer. Because of this and to keep in line with other changes, it was thought best to pick somebody else. It seemed a good idea to choose a Crewkerne resident and Chris was proposed and elected. Mention was made of Mark's sterling service.
- e) Scrap-book Keeper: Steve agreed to continue. We all agreed to meet at some (unspecified) time, armed with incriminating photographs and other relevant bursf, for a grand scrap-book session.
- f) Publicity Person : It was proposed that this office be abolished and

- 4 Treasurer's Report: Richard, deputising for Mark, informed the meeting that there was £126.17 in the account
- 5 Dancing Policy: Doing Fieldtown having proved unwise, it was agreed to concentrate mainly on improving our Bledington, but also to learn the Upton-upon-Severn stick dance and another Bampton or two.
- 6 Programme: Most people felt most pubs had been a success. We hope for a weekend away in 1985 as this was missed in 1984.

7 Other Business

- a) Badges: Rod is keen and will investigate.
- b) Fool: It was agreed that we do not have enough members to support a Fool. Obviously we're not in politics.
- c) Publicity: It was agreed that we should seek more publicity, preferably free, in newspapers and elsewhere, particularly with a view to increasing our membership.

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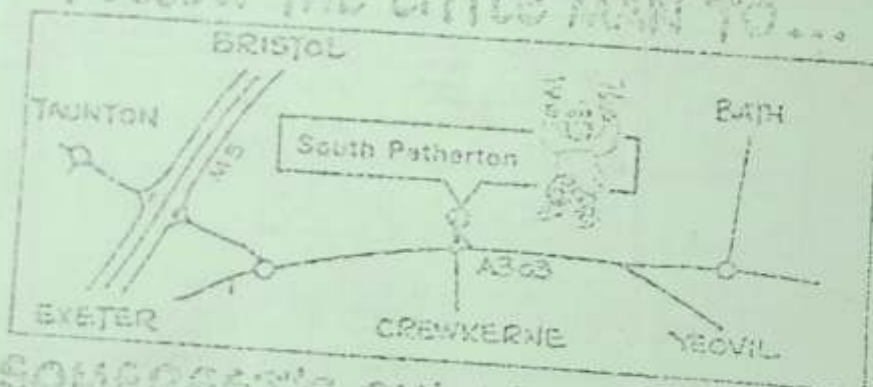

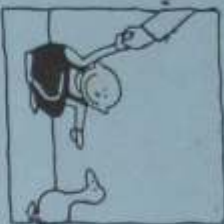

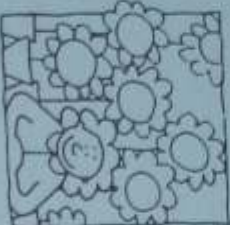

DANCING WITH CREWKERNE'S MORRIS TEAM

AFTER September you will be able to pull the other one and find it has bells on it.

For people are being invited to join the Dr Turberville's Morris dancers of Crewkerne.

Dr Turberville's is currently 15-strong, in almost equal proportions of men and women, and is looking for more members.

Standing in blaring sunshine at the recent Chard Kingfisher vintage rally while Dr Turberville's and their weekend guests the Aber Morris from Aberystwyth danced on, senior member Richard Ashe explained about the dancers.

"We take Dr Turberville's name because he was one of the two famous people Crewkerne has ever produced. The 'Ralph Reader' Morris doesn't have the same ring to it."

Dr Turberville's was established three years ago, and dances in green and burgandy with an array of batons, hankies and stout staves with which they set to in unreserved fashion. The dancing is looked on seriously, as part of the national heritage rather than "a bit of a joke".

But it is also a great way to meet people, dancers declared. The social life is good, and it is noticeable that dancing never seems to be done far from a pub.

Half the Dr Turberville dances are modern creations, the other are traditional dances.

"They were collected in the late 19th century by Cecil Sharp," said Mr Ashe.

"That's when they were noted down in the form they are mostly danced today."

By its nature, however, dance cannot be precisely defined on paper the way

language or music can. Each dance group establishes its own variations and interpretations, even within the same Morris "region" (style). Crewkerne's style is the Cotswold, as opposed to border or northwest.

"We could always do with more members," said Mr Ashe. "The more there are the less commitment any individual has to put into it."

Should any further encouragement be needed, there was another wholly splendid advocate of the dance on tour — Gorgeous Guinevere of the Aber Morris.

Guinevere is not too proud to admit "she" is internationally famous, nor to display the outstanding designer underwear that's helped her achieve that position.

"I can't help my astonishing good looks," she confided. "I am the sex symbol of the side; it's traditional to have a Tommy or a Jimmy. Welsh sides have a Megan. But we've got Gorgeous Guinevere."

Aber are 10 years old next year, and Dr Turberville's will be invited back with every other side with which the Welsh side has contracts for a blow-out celebration.

"Morris is a great way of meeting people," said Guinevere.

The dance has become popular world-wide, and predictably there are American sides in the fore-front of the world craze. But it is not something that was imported to Wales.

"It used to be a very strong tradition in Wales before the Methodist take-over. The Methodist revival in the 18th century at once made dancing a no-no."

In England, too, Morris is now on the wane. Said Mr Ashe: "It's slightly less popular. It had a big revival in the sixties and the beginning of the seventies, and a lot of sides started up. Now the novelty has worn off a little bit."

If the novelty, the friendship and the whole eccentricity of Morris dancing strikes you, Dr Turberville's rehearse weekly in the Abbey Street church rooms and would love to see new recruits for the winter rehearsal programme, from September on.
