PRACTICES

Dr Turberville's Morris Annual Beneral Meeting 1992

Held on Tuesday, 15th September at 8pm.

Present were Edna (Squire), Terry (Moneybags), Dave (Foreman), Nick (Postbag), Caroline, Heather, and Alan

Apologies were received from Deb and Derek (on holiday), and Andrew and Sam (working?)

Lindsey had been invited to join us after college and arrived during "AOB"

MINUTES of last AGM (1991) had been mislaid but no-one wished to make any comment on them.

REPORTS of OFFICERS 1991/2

Squire's Report was presented in verse (manuscript attached).

Foreman's Report

- The year had been difficult owing to low numbers but all had performed well thanks to all and particularly to Alan and Heather who picked up the dances remarkably quickly.
- 2. We were sorry to have Terry only 2 weeks in every four owing to work, and were generally able to dance only when Terry was here.
- 3. We were very glad to have had Nick Male for the Summer (on vacation from UEA), who bravely danced out after only one practice with us and performed extremely well.

Edna thanked Dave for his report and added thanks for his teaching, particularly the introduction of a new tradition (Wayford) which everyone had found interesting as a new challenge, although we had been unable to dance it out. Dave was also thanked for planning and executing the teaching of the newcomers so successfully.

Moneybags' Report

We were largely unable to collect this year owing to our inability to accept paid bookings and the lack of an extra pair of hands to pass the hat when we danced out. As a result, our expenses - primarily for the hall - ate into the funds and the initial balance at the Building Society of £750 was reduced to £480. at the end of the year. There has been little received in subs. this year and several "payments in kind". Next year the moneybags should (and will) be more ruthless in collecting the subs.

Postbag's Report Nick had nothing to report.

Terry asked for a list of Nick's expenses (such as an approximate number of phone calls) so that he can be reimbursed. Edna asked for her expenses in kind...!

Publicity Officer's Report No publicity had been done. Uncertain who was elected PO last year.

Scrap Book There had been little opportunity to take photos for the same reason that the hat had not been passed. Edna asked that any items the side might have be passed to her. Two videos were made at the Three Elms North Wootton, and these were shown after the meeting.

ELECTIONS

Edna and Nick had carved up discussed the election of officers in advance!

Edna stood down as Squire, claiming to make a better fool than squire! Nick was proposed, seconded and elected nem. con.

Dave is happy to continue as Foreman unless a challenger appears, and was elected nem. con. (or a.w.e.n.c)

Terry wishes to continue as Moneybags, a.w.e.n.c. he will have the signatories on the Account changed to include Caroline for the purpose of withdrawals when he is away.

Edna offered to combine the rôles of Post Bag, Publicity and Scrap-book a.w.e.n.c. but may ask for help later in the season. Alan said he would be happy to help however he can!

PRACTICES 1992/93

The cost of the Church Hall is rather high when numbers are low (£10/night). Misterton WI Hall costs £3/hour and is acceptable, but is only available up to 3 weeks each month. Other suggestions included the Misterton Village Hall (£3/hour), The Glovers' (Yeovil), which used to be £3/night; Haselbury Mill (free but not quite comfortable since people are around), Great Western (Yeovil - free but low headroom). It was resolved that we will book the WI Hall for the available night until Xmas, and try a variety of venues for the fourth night each month.

Practices are to start soon after the last dance out (Tuesday 22nd Dept at Dinnington). Terry will make the bookings provisional from 29th Sept to Xmas, but Nick "doesn't want to bugger the WI"!

Fiona will again come to make up numbers for practices when needed.

SUBS

Terry does not want any more "payment in kind" (at least not at the moment). The subs were set at £10 / half season, an increase of 11.1% but the first increase for several years. At this level, the subs would not quite meet the cost of the practice hall. Thus the first payment of £10 is due on 29th Sept, and the balance of £10 on the 2nd Feb.

CALENDAR

It was agreed that we should discuss dancing out, etc, later in the season when we have more idea of numbers.

TENTH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

This season marks the beginning of Turbs' tenth year and it was agreed that it should be marked in some way. The first Turbs practice was held on Tues 22nd Sept 1982. The preferred format is a mini weekend or full day tour plus evening party, to which all former Turbs and their current sides (if any) could be invited. Alan was landed with the job of organising it, to start by contacting the ex members and see who can come and when. May was suggested since it marks the tenth anniversary of Turbs' first dance out, and being early may be more suitable for the guests. However May 1st falls on a bank hol, weekend and may be awkward, and the end of May could be half term as well as being a bank hol, which might be good or bad!

AOB

There was quite a lot of AOB (far too much in Edna's view!)

 Members Leaving Presents had been bought for Deb and Derek - flask, tankard, whisky and Captain Pugwash book. A suitable inscription for Derek was discussed! Derek joined Sept 88, Deb in Feb 88. Caroline is leaving temporarily (baby due in 2 weeks) but hopes to come back. She plans to buy her own gift for us.

Traditions There was some feeling that it would be nice to learn some more new dances; however it is impractical to plan to change to a new tradition without a full side of experienced dancers. Any new joiners will need to learn easier dances at first, so it was agreed that the traditions taught in the first half of the practice season would be Hinton and new Wayford dances, and we should decide at Xmas whether to drop Bampton (useful for hankie dances and intermediate in difficulty) or Bledington (more difficult and useful for stick dances which please the audiences)

Music Dave is job hunting and may not be able to come every week. With Deb having left, we need at least one new musician. Nick believes he can learn the Hinton tunes and the Wayford tunes are still largely to be chosen, and will be able to play next year whenever Dave is away. Other musicians of our acquaintance (or otherwise!) can be sought, they do not have to want to dance!

Dancers We must attract new members or our programme next year will be non-existent.





Right - we start on Friday evening (19th. March) meeting, drinking and singing in The Ostrich, down by the waterfront. The landlord is extremely morris friendly (when we go we usually end up with some free drinks, and he sings "My Way", "Stairway to Heaven" (rock on Rolf) and other such classics - all terriby good stuff). Saturday morning (20th. March), we assemble to catch the coach and go off to Blaise Castle for dancing, our re-enactment of the Bristol Giants' Legend, more dancing and a wander around the grounds (weather guaranteed - we don't know what it will be but there will definitely be some weather). Lunch and more dancing follows, at The Lamplighters in Shirehampton. Then it's back to Bristol for dancing (and shopping, if you have to) up in Clifton. This will be a chance to wander across to the Avon Gorge, the Bridge and Observatory, if you wish. In the evening, there will be food before the ceilidh (The Electric Lobsters), to be held in the Students' Union (Avon Gorge Room) from 8:00 - 12:00, with bar extension. On Sunday (21st. March), the morning is yours to spend as you will, but we will meet up again at noon at The Ostrich for more jollity before the tearful goodbyes.

The cost for this is £15, to include accommodation, breakfasts, Saturday lunch and evening meal, coach transport on Saturday and the ceilidh. £10 will get you transport, lunch, evening meal and ceilidh on the Saturday, but nowhere to sleep and no breakfast (for all you Bristolians). Under twelves can come for half price (£7.50 or £5) while toddlers under three are free.

If you could let me know as soon as possible whether or not you want to come, enclosing your cheques, made payable to Rag Morris, and with a breakdown of carnivores, omnivores, vegetarians, vegans or any other variety of food eaters you may have, then we can all meet up in just a few weeks' time.

- Squire's Report (Nick) 3.1
 - Membership. We welcomed three new members at the start of year: Kath, Rachael and Kevin. We lost two members (Lindsay and Edna) part way through the season but gained Claire in January and welcomed Fiona back into the fold. Just to make sure Claire stayed with the team I married her!" (Note: un-minuted observations from the rest of the side - including Claire - followed this remark).

"Caroline has taken "time off" in order to ensure the future generation of Dr T's though she has managed some guest appearances, as has Tash. Many thanks to them for helping us out.

"We have two definite new members starting next week (Ken and Jenny). Tash has also said he will be rejoining. Requests have been made to various papers to put notices in their "What's On" columns.

- "2. Practices. These were well attended although we did suffer from the forgetfulness of the keeper of the keys to the W.I. Hall on several occasions.
- *3. Dancing. Yet again I think we did more dancing out than we thought we would at the start of the season. A big thanks to one and all. I will leave Dave to comment on standards!
- "4. Tenth Anniversary Celebrations. Thanks to everyone for all their efforts both on the day and beforehand. The numbers who turned out was a little disappointing but I think everyone enjoyed themselves. Particular thanks to the band.
- *5. Wadebridge. A good turnout, some good dancing and good fun.
- "6. Alan. A particular thank you to Alan for all his efforts which included:

a lot of work on the "10th anniversary celebration"

organising Wadebridge

helping out with posters and publicity.

- *7. Claire. Thanks to Claire for being able to find my Morris folder when I had misplaced it on more than one occasion.
- *8. Thank You to everyone for an enjoyable season. Particularly for doing that one extra dance" (Note un-minuted comments here!) "when your body is telling you that you should be at home watching the TV with your feet up!"
- Foreman's Report (Dave) (Note: An interpretation of the Foreman's report, from notes taken at the time, is given here. I trust it is sufficiently accurate!) 3.2

Congratulations to all for their dancing, and for sticking with it this year; especially the four new members, who have done an excellent job of picking up the dances and fit in with the side very well. The standard of dancing improved throughout the season, and in particular was very good at Wadebridge even at the end when everyone was tired. Thank you team.

Apologies for the disruption caused by working away, and as a result not always being able to plan the practices, and sometimes not being able to get back to the practices. Thank you to Nick Jana Jana Jana Jana Jana Jana

for taking over very competently on those occasions, often at short notice. Naturally this led to some differences in interpretation; hope this did not cause too many problems.

This was the first year in which Wayford has been danced out, although the second year in which it had been practised. It is coming together quite well, although there are some difficulties, and especially for Terry who only has half the number of practices. Deb commented that it looked impressive at Wadebridge. It is intended to be a joint effort, so if anyone has any ideas such as new figures, we'll have a go at them! Dave has enjoyed putting together something which is quite new and doing something unique.

3.3 Moneybags' Report (Terry) (Note: report given on Terry's behalf by Nick)

The balance of moneys at Sept. 1992 stood at £488.65.

At Sept. 1993, it stands at £307.85 (including £7.80 in cash)

This represents a net expenditure of £180.80.

The hall booking fees (estimated at 24 weeks x 2 hours @ £3/hour = £144) were the largest item of expenditure, and there was also significant spending for the tenth anniversary celebrations (£?? not immediately available). Subscription to OM is about £20.

Income was from subscriptions (should have been 7 x £20 = £140), têtes (Kingsbury Episcopi £10, Misterton £10, Tintinhull £50, The Knoll £50 = total of £120) and collections (small!). For the coming year, a little more effort to collect when dancing out would be indicated.

4. Dances and Dancing

4.1 Traditions

There was general discussion about the existing traditions and the desirability of introducing any new or replacement traditions. It was generally agreed that we should now really get stuck into Wayford, learning all of the existing 5 dances (2 stick, 2 hanky, 1 jig) and developing at least one more (stick). Some, including Fiona and Alan, felt that it would be nice to bring in another tradition which is significantly different from Hinton and Bampton (i.e. not single stepping). Bledington is an obvious choice since some present and expected returning members have danced it before. Nick is reluctant to have too many traditions going at one time. Kath would prefer to concentrate on tidying up the present traditions, especially Bampton which she only learned while dancing out!

There was discussion of the number of distinct dances needed in the repertoire. To provide for two half hour spots, at least 12 dances are needed and preferably the ability to select from 14 or more. The current repertoire includes 2/3 Wayford (2 stick), 6 Hinton (4 hanky 2 stick), 3 Bampton (hanky) plus Bonny Green. There are another 2 Wayford available, no more Hinton (unless we make one up), and a fairly large number of Bampton, some of which may be interesting to dance. For additional stick dances, we could include 3 Bledington and we could work up another Wayford.

It was agreed that we should aim to have 16 - 17 dances, although the final number would depend on progress during the practice season. We will concentrate on Wayford and Hinton for the experienced dancers and beginners, with perhaps 3 Bampton and 3 Bledington later; perhaps one or more of the Bampton dances might be replaced by other Bampton dances.

4.2 Venues and Frequency

Any views on preferred venues, etc. to be passed on to the Bagman. Alan said he preferred two pubs per evening, generally, and to meet other sides when possible; distance was not really a problem, so long as it was not an early start - i.e. OK for end of May, June and July. Claire would like to meet other sides. Dave felt that this was largely a matter of being able to put together a programme; with increased numbers, this should be possible, and we could contact other sides to express our interest before Christmas.

4.3 Day of Dance

It was agreed that we do not wish to organise a day of dance this year - it could be a bit difficult when numbers are low, better to go on other sides' days and enjoy ourselves!

5 Elections

The following officers were elected for the coming year:

Squire - Nick.

Foreman - Dave. He expects to be more organised this year, as a result of greater stability in work. He may even publish a programme for the practices! (Note - this action was achieved by 21st Sept.!)

Moneybags - Terry. Note that a second signatory is required for the Building Society account:

Nick will sort this out with Terry

Post-bag / publicity - Claire. Alan will help with posters, etc. as required. Scrapbook - Fiona.

6 Kit

Shoes - Terry suggested greater uniformity and proposed black. Dave pointed out that comfort and safety come first and suggested that we simply aim for white. It was agreed that we would try to keep to white trainers; any odd splashes of colour to be in keeping with the kit if possible (e.g. green) but not mandatory.

Socks - white.

Armbands - none.

Hats - feelings were mixed. Agreed that hats would not be mandated; neither could they be ruled out (need for sun hats, etc.). Dave felt that even only one top hat looked in keeping; Nick felt that uniformity would be preferable. Alan (as the owner of one of the hats in question) had no particular views, having worn it on the assumption that the side liked it! Perhaps it should be left to the Squire's discretion on the day. No resolution was reached so the status quo prevails - i.e. do what you like!

Bells - more bell pads are needed. There are probably no spare bells in the side's kit collection, although we may be able to have the former Queen's Delight stock. Alan will enquire:

failing that, the kitty will buy a stock. Bells will remain side property.

<u>Baldrics</u> - Some members need baldrics which fit. A kit check will be held before Xmas, to cover baldrics, handkerchiefs etc. Badges on baldrics should be limited. The existing rule is believed to be up to 2.

7 Finances

Subscriptions - The rules will remain as before - i.e. children and students / unwaged free. All newcomers free for first winter season. The subs are intended to cover the costs of the practice hall and Open Morris membership; £20 per (waged) head will cover at the current rates.

Donations to Charity - Agreed to make a donation from this year's receipts. Current balance of account is just £310, having been depleted over last two years. Agreed to donate £25 to The Knoll nursing home (Yeovil) and £25 to Wayford Woods, which are to be bought and run as a charitable trust. In view of anticipated extension of legislation covering charitable collections, a charity for the coming year was not nominated despite Dave's and Alan's feelings that it is helpful to have a nominated cause when collecting. The standard reply now will be that we collect for the performance, and make donation(s) at the end of the year.

8 Open Morris

Agreed to continue current membership of O.M., obtaining the benefits of insurance and contact with other sides through a regular magazine.

9 Constitution

Nick provided copies of a draft constitution for consideration, including elements of the existing constitution and new suggestions. The adoption (or amendment) of the draft to be proposed at a the next AGM.

10 A.O.B.

Showcase - Yeovil, 25th Sept. Arrangements confirmed.

Xmas meal - to be arranged in a future bag session. End of Season meal venues / dates to be discussed at first practice. Age range - Agreed that there need be no set minimum age for membership, but if under 14 then a parent / guardian or other responsible adult must be present when dancing out. No concessions would be made to youngsters - i.e. we will not form a "minor's" set, so the youngsters must be able to cope with an adult practice and standards. Care must be taken with sticks, etc. to prevent injuries.

Badges - There are about 20 badges of the current rainbow - penguin design in the stock. Fiona has a master for a Turberville coat of arms design, and a badge machine can be borrowed from Wadham School. Agreed to make up some more badges, possibly with

more than one design to maximise selling possibilities.

Sweatshirts - Alan wants a sweatshirt! Last design (World Tour) not available - company holding plates will not release. Alan will investigate costs from new suppliers.

Hinton workshop - Morris Federation is planning to launch a manual for Hinton, and follow with a workshop. Agreed we would like to know more, and perhaps be involved in pre-release velting; certainly likely to wish to be involved in workshop. Post-bag to contact M.F.

Vote of thanks to the officers - Alan wished to thank Nick and Dave for the tremendous efforts they made last year, which resulted in a good dancing season against the odds!

FACTS

Dr Turberville's Morris are a group of men and women dancing Cotswold morris dances formed in 1982.

Based in South Somerset - current members come from Misterton, Crewkerne, Yeovil and Somerton.

Practising in Misterton on Tuesday evenings.

Cotswold dances typically involve 6 dancers using either sticks or hankies though there are some hand clapping dances.

Cotswold morris dances originate from the Cotswold villages each village having its own set of dances done in their own style. The set of dances and the style together form the "tradition". Some of the villages whose "traditions" have survived are Fieldtown, Bampton and Adderbury.

The music is usually played on melodeons, accordions, concertinas and violins. Though whistles, flutes, cellos and even bagpipes have been used! We are open to suggestions - all musicians welcome.

We practice during the Autumn and Winter and then dance out at pubs, fetes and special occasions during the Spring and Summer. We also join other morris teams on weekends of dance both locally and further afield.

Dr Turberville's - South Somerset's mixed Cotswold morris team - have "discovered" a new set of morris dances or "tradition". The "Weyford Manor tradition" is being lovingly recreated by the team from some ancient manuscripts, though there are several gaps that are having to be filled in as the manuscripts have been damaged over the years (mainly by spilt ale!) and are not complete.
