


Minutes of Dr. Turberville's AGM 26th September 2000 at 244, Goldcroft

- 1 Present: Alan, Heather, Jan, Wendy, Sarah, Fiona, Dave, Sam (see below)
Apologies: Kath, Terry, Catherine, Sam (but she turned up!). Heather kept on
apologising for Alan who was there!

2. The minutes of the 1999 AGM were accepted.

3. Matters arising: We did 8ii - amplifier, but didn't do 8iii - advertising and 8iv - Cecil Sharp music.

4. Squire's Report:

Catherine thanked everyone for an enjoyable season. Despite low numbers everyone made a tremendous effort and we had a successful year. She hoped that everyone enjoyed the weekends away, although ruefully admitted that some of our enjoyment had been at her expense (Black Sheep episode). Catherine said that Sam and Sarah would back her up in declaring single regatta as the tune of the year. We kept to our original programme, and Lads a bunchum was the most frequently danced item. Special thanks to Steve, Bryan and Alan for their help. Thanks also for her 18th Birthday present. She looks forward to seeing us at the first practice.

Foreman's Report:

Dave said we varied our repertoire a bit this year, dancing Wayford, Ilmington, Bampton and Hinton. Sadly no Sherbourne was danced. He said our standard had been good, lines have been spot on, except for the infamous "Wadebride variations" where we simultaneously started 6 different dances within one set. Unfortunately there were no new dancers or musicians this year, a round of applause was given to our existing musicians. Dave would like to introduce a new tradition alongside the existing ones, and recommended Bledington, to broaden the repertoire, he thinks the side is up to it. Dave became a little rambling and incoherent at this point. Alan spoke from the floor, sitting down, to thank Dave for keeping us up to scratch. Everyone apologised for their mistakes. Dave said we get a lot higher than some sides.

Moneybags:

Pub takings had been good this year. Bookings had been down. It was agreed to pay Dave for the amplifier, microphone and stand. Dave was asked to see if he could add this to his existing music insurance. The accounts and projected expenditure were unanimously approved.

Sarah reported that this is coming together, and that she has lots of photos this year.

5. Election of Officers

- Squire: Fiona was elected. Proposed by Dave, seconded by Jan, with a mandate to "control Alan" (Failed on that one, then)
Deputy Squire: Wendy, by unanimous acclaim.
Foreman: Dave, by unanimous acclaim.
Moneybags/Postbags: Alan and Heather, proposed by Fiona, Seconded By Jan, unanimous.
Scrapbook: Sarah, proposed by Wendy, seconded by Jan, unanimous.

6. Financial Matters.

- 6i . Donations to charity: Catherine's VSO in Africa was mentioned, as was the BRL. A total of £50 to be given. We decided to see what fund raising we could do for Catherine.
6ii Bags to investigate whether to continue with OM or move to the Federation. Side to decide before Christmas.

- 6iii It was decided that there was no need to pay subs at present.
- 6iv New bags to investigate moving the bank account somewhere more convenient.
It was decided to call an EGM to discuss this when the facts are to hand.

7. Traditions:

Someone suggested that we learn the willy whacking dance. Dave and Fiona requested that we add Bledinto to the existing repertoire. Alan said that we are now sufficiently experienced to take on new traditions. Someone suggested more Ilmington dances. Alan wants the differences between traditions to be made clear. Everyone needs to learn the 4 person dances. The musicians need to learn to play the jigs, and separate music practices were suggested. Sam promised to dance, back permitting (it didn't) Alan wanted everyone to learn a jig (well Sarah did, what about Alan???). Fiona suggested that we need a comedy item dance, as the whole side, excepting Dave, were very taken with the pitchfork dance at Dawlish. Jan said that stick dances are more entertaining. Everyone agreed that the major audience participation event of the year was with the Downs Syndrome sufferers at Wadebridge. Fiona suggested trying to dance out with other sides more to give us a rest, and that we don't want to lose audience interest by "going on too much" or having excessively long spots. Alan felt that we need to structure the entertainment. Heather suggested doing it by gauging audience reaction on the night.

8. A.O.B. (Which we already started under 7!!!)

- 8.i. Dave to solicit Debbie to re-join. Jan suggested a selective breeding/GMO programme. Alan offered to genetically modify any volunteers for this.
- 8.ii. Alan suggested changing our practice night.
- 8.iii. Someone wanted to make a medal with bar for the chap who always joins in at the Howley Tavern.
- 8.iv. Rag want us to dance with them at Cullompton on 23.10.00. It was decided that this was not possible. They have also invited us to Bristol for their 20th.
- 8.v. we have been invited to Teignmouth Folk Festival 22-24 June 2001.
- 8.vi. Fiona asked that we decide early if we want to go to Wadebridge as it is getting increasingly difficult to secure accommodation.
- 8.vii. Wendy suggested applying for a lottery grant, as Frome Valley had been successful.


